

## Population and Habitat Note-taking Guide - Answer Key

Pedro, his family, and all his turtle friends at this pond form the turtle population here.

A group of organisms of the <u>same</u> kind, like these turtles, living in the same <u>place</u> at the same time, is called a population.

All the water lilies here make up the water lily population at the pond.

There is also a <u>goose</u> population, a koi fish population, and a frog population in and around the pond.

These populations live together in the pond, which is their <u>habitat</u>.

A habitat is an organism's <u>home</u>. It is the space in which it <u>hunts</u> or gathers food and gets shelter.

Some habitats are on trees, some are <u>underwater</u>, and some are underground.

The <u>meadow</u> is the habitat for cows, while forests are the habitats for many plants and wild animals.
